



Law Made Public Highlights

Primary Materials

Primary materials are online resources or books that contain the actual law, itself. Examples of primary materials include: statutes, regulations, ordinances, legislative documents, court rules and case opinions which are all primary resources that tell you what the law is.

As a rule of thumb, you usually would cite to a primary resource to support your legal argument or position on a legal issue.

Secondary Materials

Secondary materials are resources that explain, interpret and analyze primary resources. Secondary materials help us understand the law. Examples of secondary resources include: legal encyclopedias, digests, practice treatises and hornbooks.

Third Floor Materials

Federal Primary Materials

- Congressional Record: Official record of the floor proceedings and debates in Congress. A resource used for conducting legislative history research.
- USCCAN (United States Code Congressional and Administrative News): unofficial version of the laws enacted by Congress and presidential messages published by West. Arranged in congressional session and public law number order.
- U.S. Code: Official version of the laws of the United States divided into 50 titles and arranged in subject matter order. Used for federal statutory research.
- U.S.C.A (U.S. Code Annotated): Unofficial version of the laws of the United States cross-referenced to other relevant statutes and secondary resources. Used as a research tool.
- FR – Federal Register: Location for the published rules and regulations issued by the Federal Administrative Agencies.
- CFR- Code of Federal Regulations: Codification of the general and permanent rules and regulations published in the Federal Register.
- United States Reporter: Official publication of the United States Supreme Court’s decisions.
- Federal Reporter: Publication of the United States Court of Appeals’ decisions.

- Federal Supplement: Publication of decisions from the United States District Courts, the United States Court of International Trade and the Special Court.
- Regional Reporters: There are 7 regional reporters that publish the decisions of the federal courts in all 50 states.

Federal Secondary Materials

- U.S. Supreme Court Digest and Federal Digest: Provides summaries of nearly all published state and federal case law. West created a classification system for every legal issue analyzed by case law. This classification system is known as the West key number system because each legal issue receives a key number (as depicted by the famous key symbol). Digests are invaluable tools for case law research; you can peruse summaries of cases discussing your issue to quickly find a case on point.
- Words and Phrases: Defines legal terms and phrases cited in case opinions. The case opinions cited are indexed in the Federal Digests and may be used as a cross-reference tool.
- A.L.R. (American Law Reports): ALR publishes a selection of federal and state cases. Each selected case receives a thorough and exhaustive detailed analysis and commentary from the publishers.
- C.J.S. (Corpus Juris Secundum): Legal encyclopedia that provides a concise description of virtually every area of law. A good starting point to any legal research.
- Federal Procedural Forms and West's Federal Forms: Provides sample federal forms for every stage in civil and criminal litigation to use as a guide for creating complaints, answers, demurrers, motions, etc.
- Federal Civil Procedure Before Trial (The Rutter Group): Discusses the practical application of pre-trial practice in federal courts.

California Primary Materials

- California Codes: Annotated version of the laws of California divided into 29 titles, each title covers a broad topic, each topic is further subdivided into divisions, chapters and articles.
- CCR (California Code of Regulations): 28 titles covering the rules and regulations of state agencies in California.
- California Reports: Official publication of the California Supreme Court's decisions.
- California Reporter: Unofficial publication of the case decisions from the California Supreme Court, the Court of Appeals and the Appellate Division of the Superior Court from 1959-1991.
- California Appellate Reports: Official publication of the California Courts of Appeals' decisions.

California Secondary Materials

- Cal. Jur. (California Jurisprudence): California specific legal encyclopedia.
- Witkin's: Expert analysis, summary and annotation of California specific substantive civil and criminal law, California procedure and California evidence.
- California Legal Forms: A transactional guide providing template forms for legal transactions, i.e. sample wills, sample shareholder agreements, sample pre-nuptial agreements, etc.
- California Causes of Action: One volume binder provides legal definitions, causes of action and elements for California Torts.
- California Forms of Pleading and Practice: Covers substantive and procedural legal civil matters with sample forms at the end of each chapter.
